## LEARNING ACTIVITIES & SUCCESS CRITERIA

I can write a brief history of shinty, telling of its origins, where it is played and the main shinty competitions of the present day:

- Research the history of shinty.
- Find out about its links with games played in Ireland, Wales and the Isle of Man.
- Find out about shinty clubs and competitions through the Camanachd Association.
- Write a report on shinty for an overseas visitor to Scotland.

I can contribute to an shinty display, with equipment, photographs and drawings showing the rules of play:

- Make a collection of shinty equipment such as camans and balls.
- Attend a shinty match, talk to the players and take photographs.
- Make a drawing of a shinty pitch, giving dimensions and showing the goals and pitch markings.
- Make a list of the main rules of play.

I can research the top shinty clubs and name some of the top players:

- Find out about shinty's premiership and divisions.
- List the winners over the last five years.
- Research which teams made it to the main cup finals over the last five years.
- When you know the top teams, find out about their top players.
- Chose one top shinty player and make a presentation to your class about him/her.

I can learn how to play shinty and take part in shinty games:

- Ask your PE teacher to give your class shinty lessons.
- Find out where shinty is played in your local area.
- · Contact your local club and ask for coaching.
- Take part in a shinty match.
